Food and drink will be supplied so please come along to have a good time.





Welcome to the newsletter of the Moonee Ponds Creek Co-ordination Committee Inc (MPCCC). We are a not-for-profit, environmentally-based, community organisation that acts as a champion for

the Moonee Ponds Creek and its tributaries. Members of the MPCCC include the Cities of Melbourne, Moonee Valley, Moreland and Hume; the Friends of Moonee Ponds Creek; and representatives from the community.

The Moonee Ponds Creek flows 68km from Yuroke in Melbourne's north-western suburbs past Melbourne Airport through the municipalities of Hume, Moreland, Moonee Valley and Melbourne, along the Tullamarine Freeway, through the Docklands and into the Yarra River to Port Phillip Bay. The five tributaries of the Moonee Ponds Creek are Greenvale, Attwood, Yuroke, Westbreen and Five Mile Creeks.

Our aim is to encourage an understanding and connection to the Moonee Ponds Creek and its tributaries; to highlight its values through education, interpretation and hands-on participation; and to revegetate and rehabilitate the Creek and its tributaries.

The MPCCC co-ordinates various programs. "Creating Creek Communities" invites and encourages the community to become involved in revegetation and other fun activities along the banks of the Creek. "CityLink Creek Connections" aims to engage and inform groups that don't traditionally get involved in environmental education. The Bushland Team maintain, restore and rehabilitate various revegetation and remnant sites along the Moonee Ponds Creek within the City of Moreland. The MPCCC also participates in Clean Up Australia Day and community festivals.

James Gibbon recently saw a native bee next to Anderson Reserve, Broadmeadows. Native invertebrates are important pollinators for our indigenous plants.

The Tawny Frogmouth is back for the 2nd year in a row at our Depot where it is nursing chicks in a ramshackle nest made out of Bursaria branches. It is another example as to why indigenous plants are so important within our

Weed Workshops

Four Plant Identification and Weed Workshops took place during September and October 2007 at the Strathnaver Grasslands. These workshops aimed to encourage and guide members of the community and Friends of Strathnaver Grasslands in identifying and then removing some of the common and threatening weed species throughout the Grasslands.

The workshops were delivered by Ben North from Merri Creek Management Committee (MCMC) as part of the joint MCMC, MPCCC and DCMC (Darebin Creek Management Committee) project funded through the Northern Nature Creek Connections Project, with funding provided by NHT.

Workshops were informal and relaxed and covered theories on weed control and different weeding methods as well as plant identification skills. Participants used newly learnt skills to remove weed species from the grassland thus reducing competition for water and nutrients for the indigenous grassland plants.

The 1st Strathmore Scouts also took part in one of the workshops, trying their hand at botanical drawings with Angela Foley from MCMC. The drawings were a good way to focus on the features of each plant and help identify them in the field. Members of the community also took part in this activity.

The participants have expressed an interest in continuing a hand weeding group at Strathnaver Grasslands to further their skills and assist in the management of the Grassland. Friends of Jacana Wetlands

12 Volunteers, 200 Plants

Everyone enjoyed planting on a beautiful warm day. Frogs could be heard calling in the creek whilst volunteers reminisced about the 2005 floods at Jacana.

Friends of Westbreen Creek

18 Volunteers, 470 plants

Volunteers braved the rain and hail that the frogs seemed to be enjoying along the creek. Thank you to Cr Kathleen Matthews-Ward who sponsored and presented three Blue Wren mugs to Rachael Stratford, Lee Allen and Charlie Gatt for their consistent participation during the 2007 planting season.

Strath-Oak Planters

20 Volunteers, 110 Plants

The Girl Guides came down on this beautiful morning to lend a hand. Planting proved difficult in some places due to the wet ground and slope making slippery work. We successfully planted out the site prepared with jute mat to minimise weed growth and continued to replace plants that had not survived from other plantings. Chestnut Teal and Black ducks were spotted happily swimming in the creek.

Gowanbrae Residents

33 Volunteers, 110 Plants staked and guarded

Almost all Primula Boulevard residents who look over the planting site came along to join in the planting, proving to be more than useful with their advice on where to plant to avoid intruding into the open space used for local soccer matches. The 36 magnificent staked and guarded red gums will add a special touch to the site.

Brunswick South West Planters

10 Volunteers, 250 Plants

The group began the day with Kelvin Thomson presenting the group with a water pump and tools, purchased from a volunteer small equipment grant organised by Stephanie Spathis and Emily Box.

The day continued with warm weather and a pleasant atmosphere whilst planting.

Boeing Reserve Troopers

17 Volunteers, 650 Plants

On the 1st day of Spring and beautiful weather, we were greeted by the Oak Park Scout group who proved to be green, keen planting machines! A yellow caterpillar and native cockroach were spotted with everyone marveling that the plants planted at the Bushes Bugs and Boomerang Festival were beginning to take shape.

Friends of Lower Moonee Ponds Creek

15 Volunteers, 200 Plants

Lots of children joined in the fun and lent a hand with the planting, as did volunteer's dogs who attended.

The scavenger hunt and doughnuts were enjoyed by all.

Strath-Oak Planters

36 Volunteers, 100 Plants

The 1st Strathmore Scouts eagerly joined in the planting, everyone's enthusiasm leading to a speedy planting with the day finishing early. We were lucky to be visited by 10 ducklings and their mother.

Friends of Upper Moonee Ponds Creek

34 Volunteers, 210 Plants

Despite the windy conditions, an inspiring number of people came on the last day of the planting season. The regular planters were happily outnumbered by the Carbon Credit Crowd courtesy of Kane Travis. Bike riders were pleased to have the tail wind for the ride home after a successful day.









Friends of Royal Park

The Friends of Royal Park were established in 2005 from a group of interested naturalists and local dog-walkers.

The aim of this Friends group is to protect local biodiversity in an inner-urban environment, while providing practical hands-on learning activities and experiences to participants that contribute to

improving the environment of Royal Park, located in Parkville

During 2007, a calendar of events was developed with activities focusing on the Royal Park Wetlands, remnant vegetation along the bushland escarpment in Royal Park West, and the Australian Native Gardens. These activities have included:

- Seed collecting
- Planting and weeding
- * Bird surveys
- Interpretative tours

During a recent seed-collecting activity by volunteers, Kangaroo Grass was found in the Royal Park West Remnant. A fire in the area last year has cleared most of the leaf litter revealing small plants existing on the skeletal soils in vicinity of power lines on the eastern side of the site, obscured by taller spear grass and shrubs. Remnant Kangaroo Grass has not been found at Royal Park for over 15 years.







Royal Park Storm Water Treatment

Many native bird species enjoy the pond within the Australian Native Garden at Royal Park. Previously, the water level of the pond was maintained by mains water. However, recently a small swale and wetland has been constructed to improve storm water quality by minimising gross pollutants and nutrients entering our waterways. Stormwater runoff from 'The Avenue' will now flow into the swale and wetland from underground pipes. Reeds and rushes will filter the stormwater which will then flow into the pond. Excess water will be returned to the stormwater system via the pond overflow thus improving the quality of water entering Moonee Ponds Creek and Port Phillip Bay. The swale and wetland in Royal Park is a City of Melbourne project assisted by Melbourne Water as part of the Yarra River Action Plan.

We are anticipating the completion of his work late this year for implementation soon thereafter. Lianna Sliwczynski is a Rover Scout who is completing her World Conservation Badge and has been working on some promotional materials for the Citylink Creek Connections Project.

During the 2007 school year, Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning (VCAL) students from St Joseph College North Melbourne have been involved in the program to develop Bush Tucka interpretative information for the Australian Native Garden within Royal Park.

The interpretative information produced by students will become part of the educational program offered by the Citylink Creek Connections Educational Officer funded by Citylink.

The program is aimed at developing an understanding of and respect for the diversity and use of Australian native plants and their nutritional value. Also to educate participants about the local Indigenous groups, their connection to the land and creek, both today and in the past.
