This is how you get to us ...


We are based in the Parks Vic compound in Woodlands Historic Park.

With the planting season over, I thought things would calm down a bit along the creek, but the season has been so warm and dry that all the weeds have already gone to seed, setting in store more problems for next spring!

But if you want to see what can be done to improve the creek, have a walk along to the Brunswick SW Planters' site. At the western end of Hope Street in Brunswick — where the footbridge crosses the creek, just to the north of the bridge is a lovely area planted over two planting sessions this year, in Autumn and Spring.

Already the grasses are flourishing and seeding, and the clumps of flowers, interspersed among the grasses, look spectacular. This is in no small measure thanks to the fantastic efforts of Michael, who has wanted to plant this corner of the creek for many years, and lovingly waters and weeds the plot. There is a seat there too, where you can sit and enjoy the creek. It is so rewarding to see what can be done — and a result like this makes everyone's hard work worthwhile.

Another dedicated 'Friend' is Kaye Oddie who has been watering the new plants we put in at the lower part of the creek — they will need all the help they can have — thank you Kaye.

There have been some fantastic bird sightings over the last couple of months ...

While trying to record the call of the **Growling Grass Frog** at Westbreen Creek, Judy Allen saw this **White-faced Heron** struggling with a **Banjo Frog.** (Could be why it had been so hard to record the frogs calling ... but she got it in the end — after two weeks of patience!)

Black Swans have been spotted nesting in two places along the creek. Kaye Oddie saw this pair in North Melbourne, and Mal Haxton reported seeing a pair with six chicks in the Jacana Wetlands.

Unfortunately, a pair nesting in Royal Park were unsuccessful, and their nest vanished.

Our Nursery

Not Just a Plant Nursery ...



Tawnie chicks with their backs to us


The big grey box outside our offices has been the nursery for two pairs of nesting birds—'our' **Tawny Frogmouths** and a pair of **Black-faced Cuckoo-shrikes**. For the third year running, the Tawnies successfully raised two balls of fluff which have now fledged and left the tree, but the Cuckoo shrikes are still hard at it fooding.

the tree, but the Cuckoo-shrikes are still hard at it, feeding their chicks. We don't know yet how many there are, but it is fascinating to watch the parents do their tag-team feeding, and seeing off the Little Ravens and Magpies that get too close.

In the shade-house we have a pair of **Fairy Wrens** nesting in a tray of *Carex* tube-stock — they have made a little tunnel amongst the stems and lined it with feathers.

There are three tiny pink babies hiding in the nest and we have to be careful not to spend too long in the shade-house, keeping the parents away.





But if you are going to provide water, think about whether the birds will come to rely on it. Don't put it out so often that they expect it to be there, because if you go on holiday and it isn't there, they are likely to suffer.

Thank you planters!


At the end of the planting season we had quite a number of seedlings left over.

Fires in The Tarnuk

An arsonist has been at work

I don't know if you have been to The Tarnuk in Westmeadows recently, but over the past few months several fires have been deliberately lit in the park. I went to see for myself last week, and was greeted with a very sorry sight.

A long stretch of the creek — about 150 metres, has been set on fire — the dense rushes (*Phragmites*) have been burned to the water and although these are now starting to re-shoot, the fires have been devastating to the surrounding vegetation.

When I was there, a lone Reed Warbler was singing in the un-burned section of reeds, and I couldn't help wondering how many nests and other creatures were destroyed by the fire. Fortunately the Banjo frogs or Pobblebonks (Limnodynastes dumerilii) and the Common Eastern Froglet (Crinia signifera) were happily making their presence known, but this area is the habitat of the endangered Growling Grass Frog (Litoria reniformis), and we can't afford to lose it.



volunteers has been burned out, and although some of the better established shrubs may re-shoot, most have been killed. The soil is bare, and only the Chilean needle-grass (awed of national significance) is regrowing, and the seeding Chilean needle-grass in the unburned section has a ready seedbed to spread to.



On a happier note, the native vegetation is adapted to fire, the *Phragmites* is growing and I found one little Yellow Gum with a green shoot appearing from what looked like a completely dead sapling. And we hope that some Microlaena stipoides may germinate next year, depending on what seed is in the soil.



According to the CFA, they have attended to 30 or 40 calls to deliberately lit fires along the creek this year — a staggering

Melbourne Water, Police and Parks Victoria personnel are patrolling the area but they are also calling on residents to be vigilant and report any suspicious behaviour. We know many of our readers regularly use the tracks along the creek, and they have been responsible for reporting many of these fires, so if you do see anything or have any relevant information about the fires, please call Detective Senior Constable Gerry Mercovich from Broadmeadows Police 9302 8211 or the Duty Officer at Greenvale Fire Station 9333 1244.

Nursery Corner

Exciting opportunity for a new community facility

In a bend along the Moonee Ponds Creek at Mascoma Street, Strathmore, there is a parcel of land that used to belong to Hume City Council — a relict of the boundary changes of 1990. Moonee Valley City Council (MVCC) recently purchased this land from Hume.

It is a 1.7 Hectare site that used to be Hume's nursery, and currently has a small commercial nursery on it, (we don't know what the lease arrangements are with this nursery) however, the area is zoned for community open space.

The purchase will enable MVCC to rectify the blind corner on the creek-side bike track, possibly to re-align the track to cut off the large detour round the loop of the creek.

There are a few buildings on the site, including shade houses and an administrative building, but it would be a wonderful site for an environmental centre.

In the future, it could provide MPCCC with an ideal home, if we ever have to move out of Woodlands.

Network — a great bringing together of communities.

Last Planting Days of the Season

After all the dry weather we have been having, it seems incredible that we had to postpone some Planting Days in August because of the rain, but we did! As a consequence we held three more sessions since the last edition of *Ponderings*, at the end of August and beginning of September:

Friends of Strathmore Ponds

There was a very convivial feel to this planting day! (There usually is of course — our Friends are such great people!) We transformed an area where there was nothing — just a deep layer of mulch — with a mixture of 414 grassland plants and shrubs. Carol, along whose fence we were planting, joined in. Jane from Waterwatch collected bugs from the creek for children of all ages to investigate with microscopes, and there were *Creeky Creature* activities for the children.




Boeing Reserve Troopers

Nineteen 'Troopers' came along to celebrate Fathers' Day by putting in some plants. It was good to see the things put in at previous planting session doing so well. It was such a beautiful sunny day that we sat around chatting for some time into the afternoon after giving 735 plants a new home — mostly grasses, with Acacias, and Allocasuarinas, Convolvulous and Wahlenbergias.



This really was the last planting day of the season, attended by fourteen stalwarts — including Stefanie, new to Gowanbrae — we look forward to seeing her again next year! All 559 plants were planted with enthusiasm — a mixture of wildflowers and ground covers, with a few Red Gums. A windy day, but our avid bike riding volunteers were pleased to have a tail wind homeward bound!

In September, we had a great planting day with the staff and clients of XL Colour Digital. This printing company has a very dynamic attitude to working sustainably and employed a consultant to advise them on how to improve their environmental footprint.
