RESIDENTS PROTEST LAND SALE BY KAYE ODDIE

150 people gathered at short notice at a Public Meeting on Sunday 4 March at Outlook Drive, Glenroy to hear about the proposed sale for development by VicTrack of a large wedge of land (3.25ha) extending from the end of Outlook Drive down to the Moonee Ponds Creek. Notice of the proposed sale had only become publicly known two weeks beforehand. President of the Friends of Moonee Ponds Creek, Kelvin Thomson, spoke saying that VicTrack had reneged on the agreement made in 2009 NOT to subdivide the land for development and that it would remain public open space. He highlighted State and local government strategies and policies that supported providing more open space to cater for the forecast increases in population, including Moreland. The Mayor of Moreland City Council, Cr John Kavanagh, along with fellow Councillors Helen Davidson, Dale Martin and Sue Bolton, explained the process, that the Council was being given the first right to purchase the land at the Valuer-General's valuation. However, this is likely to be an eight figure sum and a Resolution was passed urging VicTrack to transfer ownership (at no cost) of the open space to Moreland Council to manage as part of the Moonee Ponds Creek valley, one of Moreland's most significant open space and environmental assets. As Kelvin Thomson said, "Public land owners should stop trying to sell us something we already own."

JACANA WETLANDS UPGRADE BY LIZ FILLS



Site visit with Jason Brown, Project Manager from Melbourne Water and Billy Tran, Project Manager from project contractors, CPB. Jason and Billy took us on a tour of the wetlands and pointed out the area of works and improvements to the hydrology of the wetland.

Works have taken less than the estimated 12 months, with only the replanting of vegetation in the wetlands to be completed by mid April.

The works that have been completed include resetting of the rock chutes to create a weir system to improve the way the wetlands works hydrologically. The construction program for the rectification works will allow:

- 1. The northern and southern wetlands to cope with higher flow events and prevent the flooding of vegetation
- 2. Minimal impact on the base average flows along Moonee Ponds Creek
- 3. Improvement of the lining of the sediments ponds to allow for ongoing maintenance and improvement activities to be undertaken.

MONASH INDUSTRY TEAM INITIATIVE PROJECT REPORTS BY KAYE ODDIE

The Monash Industry Team Initiative (MITI) was undertaken from December 2017 to February 2018 as an example of a small collaborative project for the Moonee Ponds Creek. A multidisciplinary student team from Monash University partnered with Melbourne Water to study and make recommendations on:

- ⇒ Access options into the west bank of the Moonee Ponds Creek, Kensington
- ⇒ Flood-resilient materials for Moonee Ponds Creek infrastructure
- ⇒ Best practices around the world that could overcome the constraints of the Creek between Racecourse Rd and Arden St in Kensington/North Melbourne

Three reports have resulted from the MITI and comment was called from local community groups, such as FoMPC and Kensington Association. Together with the reports, the feedback will inform Melbourne Water, Melbourne City Council and the Moonee Ponds Creek Collaboration group in 'where to next' on such issues as access and materials.

DATE FOUND! 1979

The date for the demolition of the gas holder that used to stand in Moreland Road, Pascoe Vale has come to light with thanks to Kelvin Thomson and Jennifer Mok.

Local historian and member of the Essendon Historical Society, Peter Willoughby, was seeking the demolition date for an article he was researching on the Essendon Out Station Gas Holder and Depot, where the gas holder stood.

A photograph (1979) of the gas holder and depot, looking south, shows the site adjacent to the straightened course of the Moonee Ponds Creek; also the former course of the Moonee Ponds Creek and its tributary, Five Mile Creek and with Lionsville being a prominent site.

WALK WITH WURUNDJERI AT FIVE MILE CREEK

Such a lovely setting in the rock circle, and Wurundjeri Elder Uncle David Wandin and son Darren created a beautiful Welcome to Country and Smoking Ceremony. Uncle David spoke of the silcrete tools that were found during the playground construction at 5 Mile Creek and are now safely preserved on the site. The circle is in the shape of the eye of Bunjil, the Wedge—tailed Eagle and placed on the gentle slope so that when it rains tears form and fall to the creek. The boulders, in groups of threes, represent the three clans who met here on days not so long ago.

Kate McCaughey, Moonee Valley's Manager Community Planning addressed the gathering and spoke of the value of green spaces that connect communities and the importance of preserving our indigenous heritage. The ceremony was followed by a community planting. The Murnong or Yam Daisies, a valuable indigenous food source once common in our area, were planted into beds in and around the stone circle and there are plans to return in October for the harvest. Friends of Five Mile Creek stalwarts, Ginny Moylan and Anne Black attended with their children and grandchildren representing decades of care and lobbying, transforming the creek's treeless, weed covered banks into the wonderful habitat that exists today.

FROG HOTELS COME TO MOONEE VALLEY

Sites around Moonee Valley have been included in a new research project:

ARITIFICIAL COVER STRUCTURES AS SHELTER AND CALLING SITES FOR FROGS MSc Project, School of Ecosystem and Forest sciences, The University of Melbourne

Student: Jasmin Hartel; Supervisor: A/Prof Kirsten Parris

They propose to deploy artificial cover structures (arrays of PVC pipe and Vinidex slotted agricultural pipe) at up to 40 wetlands around Melbourne, to assess whether:

- a) these are used by frogs of different species as shelter and/or calling sites
- b) use varies with season
- c) the pipes provide a benefit to male frogs in noisy environments, by acting as a sound chamber that amplifies their advertisement calls

The photograph shows a picture of the Moonee Ponds Creek concrete drain with a Eucalyptus sapling growing through the cracks. In Susie's words, "The image to our minds is a terrific reminder of the serendipitous nature of nature repairing on its own, a perfect example for the Australian Pavilion theme "Repair". Chris and Susie skilfully crafted the Moonee Ponds Creek Master Plan "to support the hopes and ambitions of the community through the exemplary dedication and commitment of the Friends of Moonee Ponds Creek".

While approval for the photo to be used was given under the umbrella of the Moonee Ponds Creek Coordination Committee (MPCCC) collection now in the hands of Friends of Moonee Ponds Creek, mystery still surrounds the identity of the photographer, a mystery Ponderings would love to solve.

CREEK WATCH

Rapid change of water levels or discolouration of problems along the creek that need to be reported:

- High water flows coming out of drains during a period of <u>no rain</u> could indicate a leaking water main or underground burst pipe. To report this, contact Yarra Valley Water for the east side of the bank and City West Water for the west side of the bank.
- If the creek water is yellow or white or otherwise discoloured, this could indicate trade waste being dumped into the creek. This needs to be urgently reported to the EPA.
